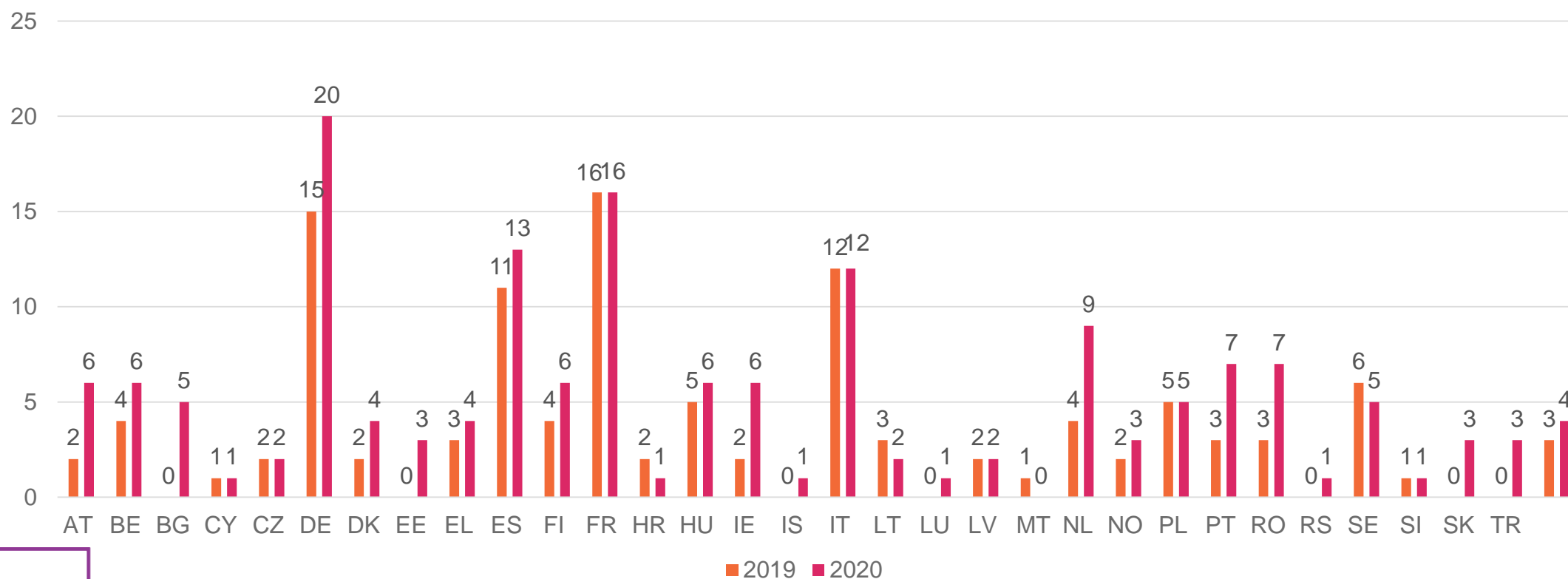

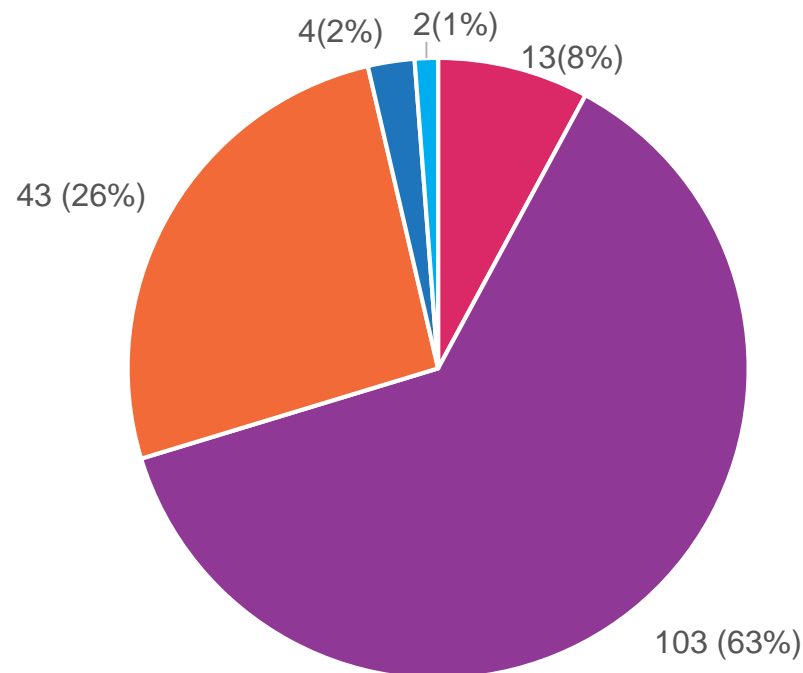
Geographic Distribution

Common definition

"A micro-credential is a proof of the learning outcomes that a learner has acquired following a short learning experience. These learning outcomes have been assessed against transparent standards."

The proof is contained in a certified document that lists the name of the holder, the achieved learning outcomes, the assessment method, the awarding body and, where applicable, the qualifications framework level and the credits gained. Micro-credentials are owned by the learner, can be shared, are portable and may be combined into larger credentials or qualifications. They are underpinned by quality assurance following agreed standards.

Micro-credentials: The way forward



A common definition

Wide **consultations** among the education and training community

Follow-up by the **Council of ministers**

Establish the appropriate follow up structure for micro-credentials within the **Bologna Process working structures**

Quality Assurance

Ensure that micro-credentials are included in **internal and external quality assurance processes** at higher education institutions and at national level, in line with the Standards and Guidelines for Quality Assurance in the European Higher Education Area (ESG).

Progressive development of a **list of trusted non-higher education institution providers** of micro-credentials.

Recognition

Release of **guidelines** on how to ensure a quicker process for the recognition of micro-credentials and how to address their stackability

Adaptation of existing instruments or adoption of new ones to facilitate the **validation and recognition** of micro-credentials

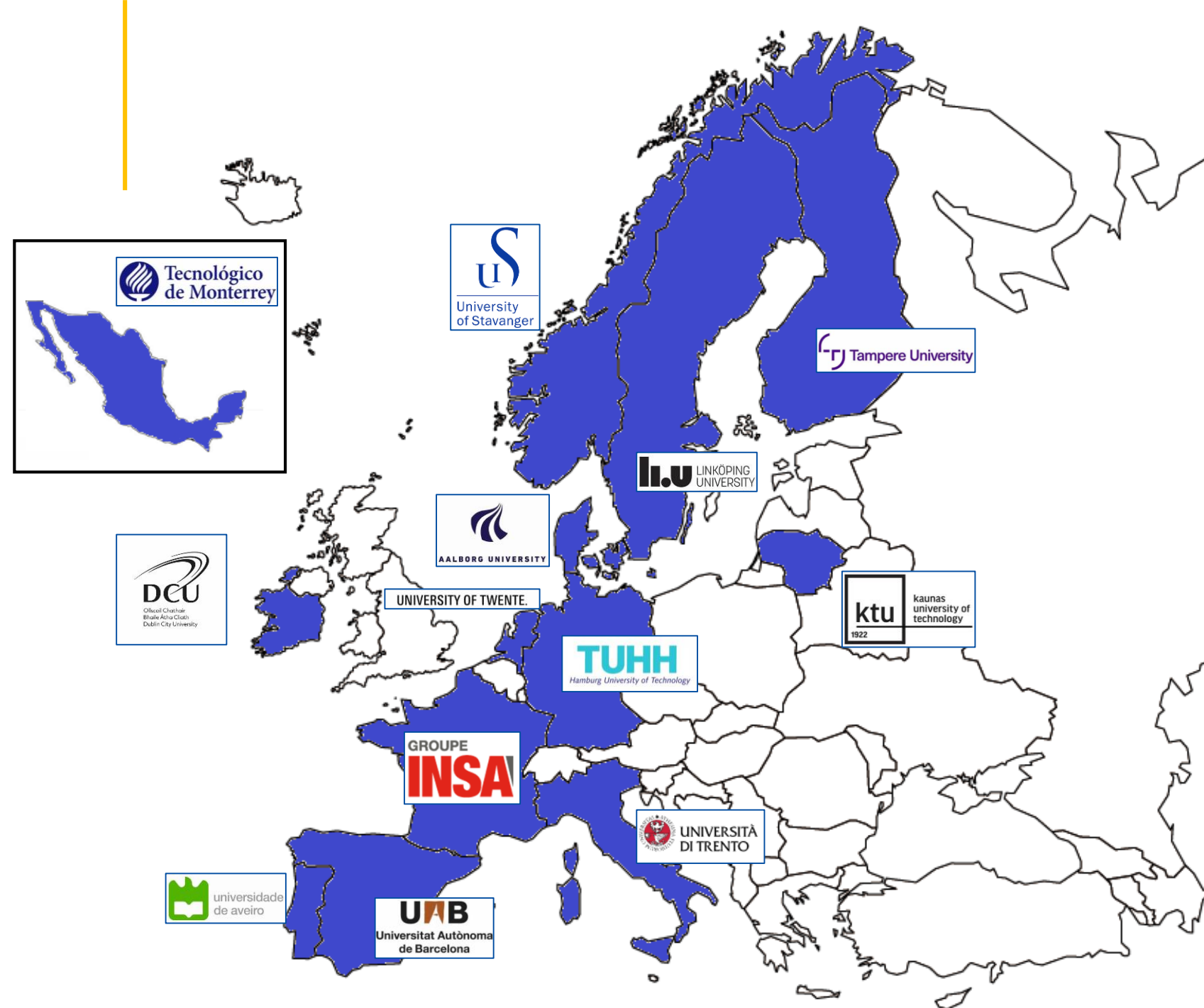

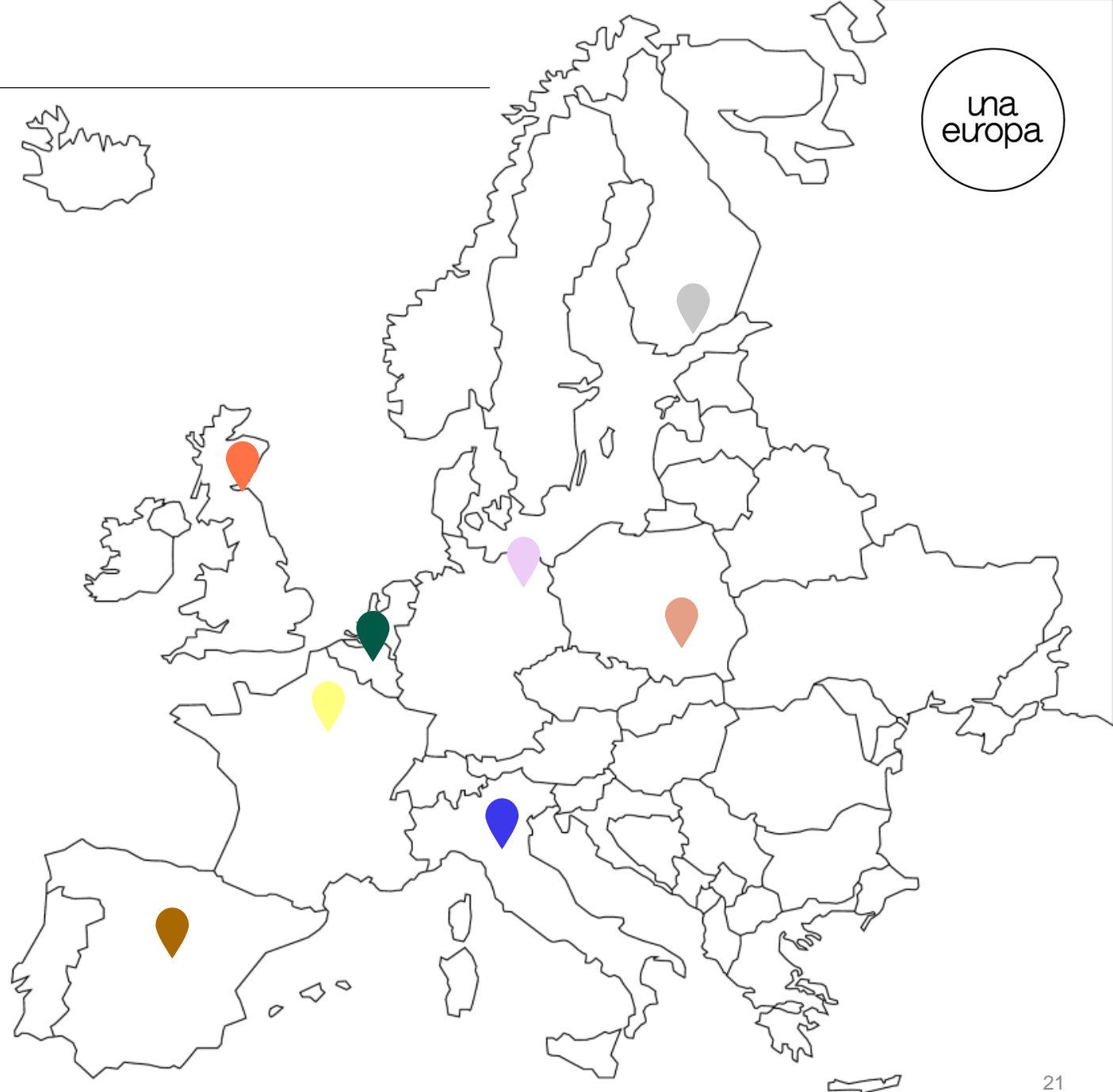

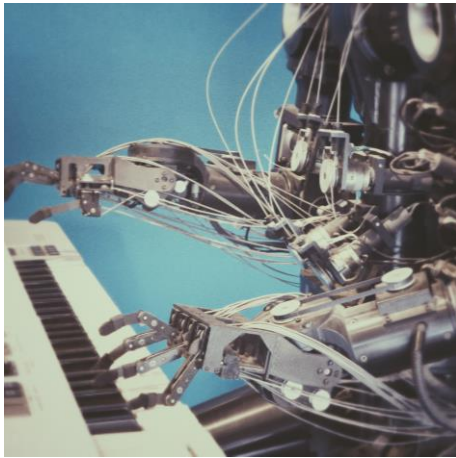

- Stimulating active and deep-level learning through high impact pedagogies.



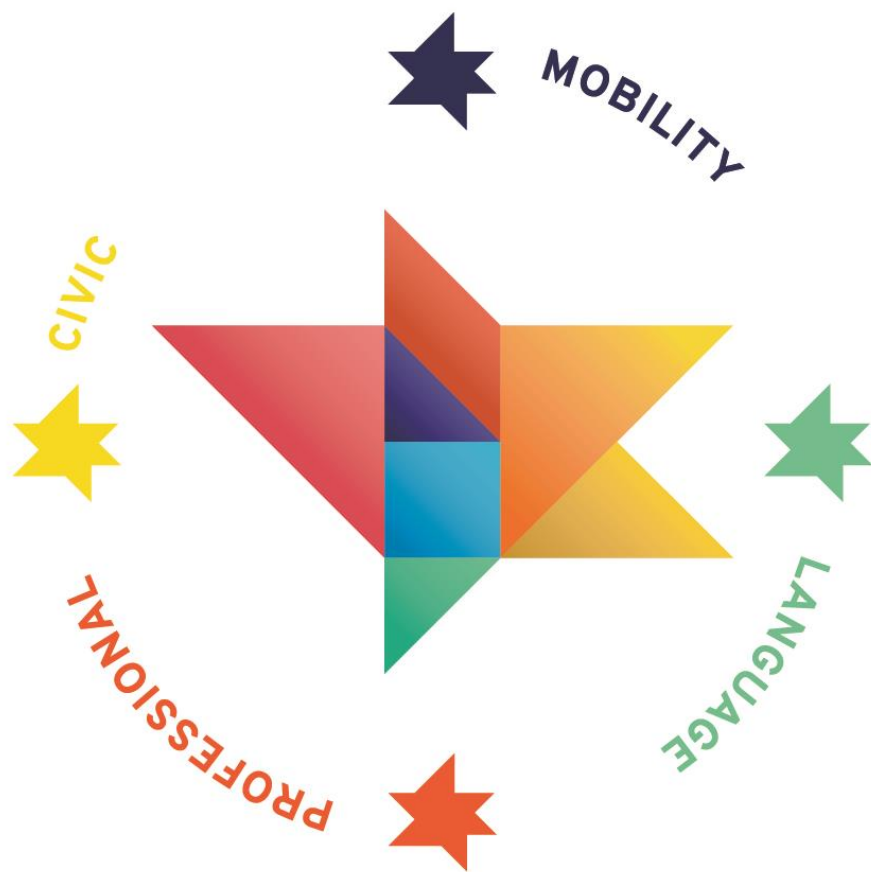
Joint micro-credentials Format



- Consists of special, jointly delivered international MOOCs, accredited by all Una Europa partners and joint certificate awarded on completion
- Open to all with undergraduate degree in any discipline and/or equivalent work experience
- Particularly relevant for students with master degree to reinforce employability or professionals seeking a qualification in a specific topic
- Fosters the enrolment of students and professionals for master or doctoral level studies.



YUFE Star System



The YUFE Star System presents a unique assessment and recognition system fostering personal skills development and lifelong learning.

- Pilot launched on 24 November 2020.
- Awarded through the YUFE Diploma Supplement.

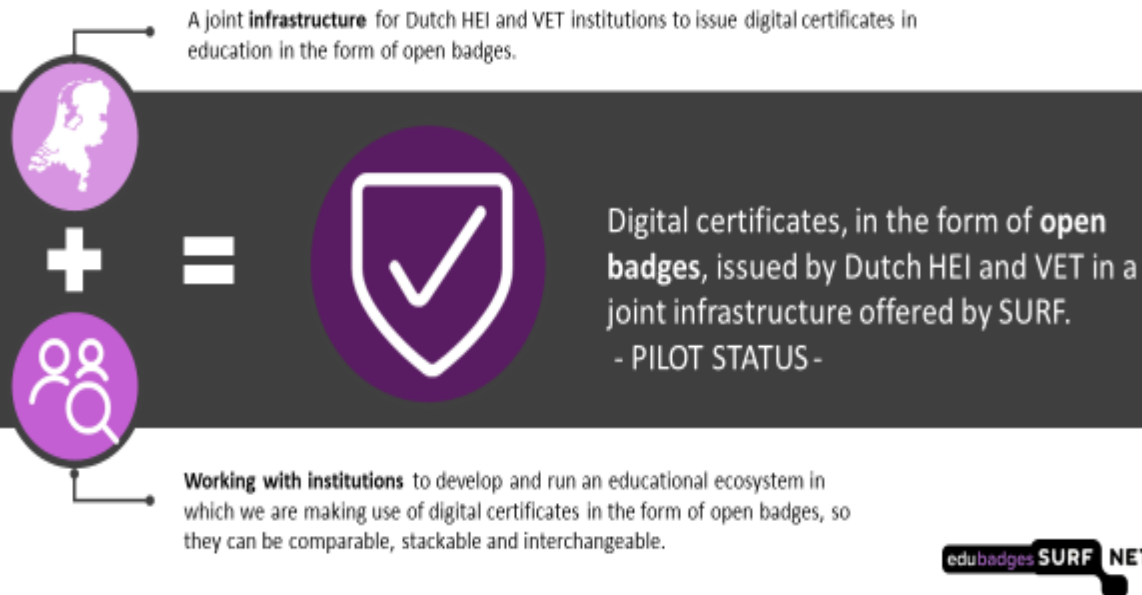

Multi-Campus Micro-Credentials System in Irish Universities

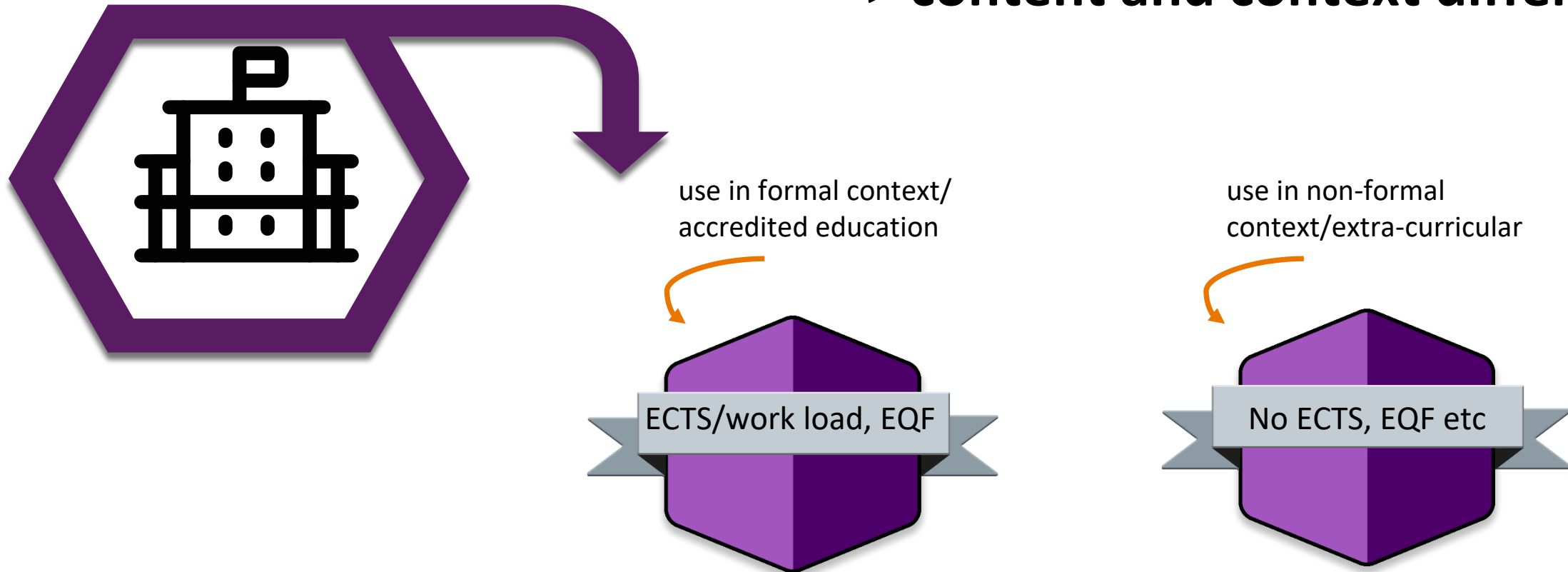
- 4 years project from national funding
- Establishing an innovative system of quality assured and accredited micro-credentials across 7 Irish universities
- Building engagement with enterprise
- Developing a “shop-window” portal
- Guidance on learners
